"Our children are our curriculum."

Children today are born into a world buzzing with technology—often holding an iPad before they can say "Mama". As educators and carers, we ask: What does this mean for their developing minds? Digital childhood has changed the way children think, learn, and engage with the world. Their attention jumps like a kangaroo on a trampoline—and we believe in embracing this, not fighting it.

At Woodlands Nursery, we know that when children move, their brains groove—creating multi-sensory learning highways that last a lifetime.

We believe the children are our curriculum. Each day is different. Every child is unique. But our **core intent remains the same**:

To support every child to become resilient, independent, curious, communicative, and capable of building meaningful relationships.



Our Approach to Learning

We follow a skills-based Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) curriculum, supported by the EYFS and OPAL Milestones.

Our approach includes:

- Child-led planning
- Play-based learning
- Real-life experiences
- Reduced paperwork so staff can focus on relationships and play

We focus on what matters most: being present, intentional, and responsive to every child's journey.



🦊 Woodland Animals – Our Curriculum Aims

We symbolise our curriculum goals through our Woodland Animals, each representing a key attribute we want our children to leave with:

- Curious Fox We play and explore new experiences and show interest in the world around us
- Striendly Squirrel We make meaningful relationships with the adults and children. We can understand and regulate our emotions.
- Communicative Owl We are confident talkers with a wide vocabulary and have a love of books.
- Independent Badger We can do things by ourselves and look after our bodies.
- **Resilient Hedgehog** We are problem solvers and keep trying!

These animals help us tell the story of each child's journey in a playful, memorable way.

Assessment

We prioritise **formative assessment**—ongoing, real-time understanding of children's development. Our staff team meets regularly to discuss every child, particularly during **Spotlight Weeks**, which help us:

- Review progress
- Set new goals
- Share insights with families
- Revisit and adapt after 3 months

We intentionally **limit written observations** to ensure our focus remains on being with the children, not constantly writing about them.

Curriculum Areas

The EYFS is organised into seven areas of learning and development:

Prime Areas

1. Communication and Language

We foster rich conversations through:

- Daily stories, songs, rhymes, and discussions
- Adult modelling of new vocabulary and language
- Props, role play, and open-ended resources
- Reading for pleasure and information
- WELCOMM screening for all children

2. Personal, Social and Emotional Development

We help children feel safe, seen, and strong by:

- Building secure attachments through a key person system
- Supporting emotional regulation, independence, and confidence
- Promoting kindness, friendships, and cooperation
- Encouraging children to make choices and express their feelings
- Learning about healthy eating, hygiene, and keeping safe

3. Physical Development

We provide daily opportunities for:

- Large and small movement play (indoors and outdoors)
- Activities that build core strength, balance, and fine motor control
- Dough Disco, obstacle courses, dance, and climbing
- Developing independence in self-care (dressing, eating, toileting)

Specific Areas

4. Literacy

We nurture a love of reading and writing by:

- Daily story time and book talk
- Mark making and writing throughout the setting
- Book of the week, story sacks, rhyme sessions
- Letter and sound games
- Trips to the local library

Children learn that writing has purpose, and every mark matters.

5. Mathematics

We bring maths to life through:

- Number and shape of the week
- Cooking, counting, measuring, sorting, comparing
- Songs, games, puzzles and dice play
- Real-life maths during mealtimes, routines, and role play

6. Understanding the World

We encourage exploration of the world through:

- Nature walks, bug hunts, planting and growing
- Visits to care homes, shops, and fire stations
- Celebrating different cultures and traditions
- Talking about family life and personal experiences
- Investigation sheds, non-fiction books, and child-led topics
- Children to learn to use technology safely and purposefully

7. Expressive Arts and Design

We promote creativity by:

- Offering a variety of materials and media
- Encouraging imagination through role play, music, movement and dance
- Providing daily access to painting, sculpting, building, dressing up and imaginative resources
- Creating space for children to express themselves freely

Celebrating Special Moments

Throughout the year, we recognise and celebrate:

- A wide range of cultural festivals
- Shared meals and food tasting
- Dressing up days
- Visitors from the community
- Local outings
